

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

## From The Rabbis' Study...

#### Ma Nishtana – What's Up?

In case time has gotten away from you as it has from me, the end of March brings us once again to the second most observed Jewish holy day. Monday night, March 29<sup>th</sup>



is Seder night. The two most observed Jewish practices are lighting Hanukkah candles and holding a Pesach Seder. The guestion becomes what kind of Seder do we hold? Whatever you can think of is what someone does. There are some who have no ritual besides asking the Five Questions. If you thought that there are only Four Questions, clearly you don't have anyone at your table who asks persistently, When do we eat? There are some who have both *matza* and bread at the Seder table. While I respect the choice to have a Seder, I know that the potential is far beyond what I have just described.

That is the reason for the title of my column. It contains a reference to a beer commercial (you know the brand) as well as to the idea that what is old can always be made new with a little bit of effort. The beer company wanted to refresh the brand by making it appear current and cool. I want to refresh the Seder by suggesting taking a new look at what we do and why. In other words, I want us to take control of what our Passover Seder looks like by making it personal, interactive, participatory and fluid. Here are a few suggestions:

1. Choose a good Haggadah. This is the play-book of the Seder. If you use something that you picked up for free in the supermarket, you get what you pay for. Use a book that has pictures, suggestions for longer or shorter Seders, parts for kids, transliterations of Hebrew, and explanations. Both the Conservative and Reform movements have really good Haggadot. I also recommend The Family Haggadah (haggadahsrus.com).

2. Prepare a set of discussion questions that can take the place of reading paragraph after paragraph or that can supplement what you read. Consider:

a. What was it like to be a slave in Egypt?

b. What makes us slaves today?

c. What was the most important object you took with you from Eaypt?

d. What does "freedom" mean to you? Has that meaning changed over time?

e. Write your own verse for Dayeinu.

3. Leave time to say some form of Grace after Meals (Birkat HaMazon) or ask each person to share one thing that he/she is thankful for.

4. Sing Pesach songs. Almost every haggadah has songs in the back. You can find recordings on-line if you don't know the melodies. In particular, choose the counting songs that allow for children to participate by challenging each other or by making appropriate noises (Chad Gadya, Echad Mi Yodea, etc).

The idea is that there is never a reason that the Seder should be predictable or routine. Don't be afraid to make changes every year starting this year. Tradition tells us that we ought to see ourselves "as if we were slaves to Pharaoh and God brought us forth." If so, then we have so much to tell and never enough time to do so. May you have a fun and meaningful Seder and may the food be both plentiful and delicious.

### Preparing Our Homes And Our Souls For Passover

Pesach begins at the end of this month and

it is time to get the leaven out! From 10 am Monday, March 29 until sundown on Tuesday, April 6 it is forbidden for Jews to eat, own, or derive benefit from *chametz*. *Chametz* is any food or beverage that contains wheat, barley, oat, spelt or rye that has come into contact with moisture and allowed to leaven or ferment. It is written in the book of Exodus, "You shall observe the feast of Unleavened Bread, for on this day I brought your ranks out of the land of Egypt...No leaven (chametz) shall be found in your homes for seven days. For whoever eats what is leavened that person shall be cut off from the community of Israel."

The Rabbis identified leaven with the evil inclination, the urge that gives rise to wrong-doing. Philo, the great philosopher once said, "Just as leaven is banned because it is puffed up, we must ban self righteousness that puffs us up with false By removing the leaven from our homes and from pride." our lives, we symbolically express our desire to liberate ourselves from the corrupting influences which make us subservient to our passions and evil impulses. Thus, Pesach is not only a time to recall and celebrate our freedom from Egyptian bondage, but it is also a time to rejoice in our ability to free ourselves of those elements from within us that enslave.

There are four steps to follow for the complete removal of *chametz* prior to Pesach. The first step is Bedikat *Chametz*, the ceremonial search for leaven. The search is conducted by the light of a candle or a flashlight on the night before Pesach. By this time the house should have been thoroughly cleaned and little piles of *chametz* placed around the house to be found during the search. When Bedikat Chametz has been completed the following formula is recited: "May all leaven in my possession which I have not seen or removed be regarded as mere dust of the earth." This is the second step in the removal of *chametz* and is called **Bitul Chametz**. The third step is **Biur Chametz**, the burning of chametz. The fourth and final step in getting the leaven out is Mechirat Chametz, the selling of chametz. (For details on Mechirat Chametz, see page 8.)

While we are in the process of getting rid of all the crumbs in our kitchens, let us make sure that we have done what we can to get rid of the crumbs in our lives. As we begin the celebration of Passover, our souls should be pure and ready to begin on a new journey that is free of enslaving habits. Each year we have the opportunity to re-experience our redemption and then to rejoice by singing Hallelujah, praise the Lord. The meticulous observance of Passover and all of its rituals can add a very special dimension to our lives and help in the concretization of many important values. May this be a holiday on which we all can fully rejoice in our freedom from all that enslaves.

### CANTOR'S NOTES The Big Thaw By Hazzan Marcia Lane

I know it's been freezing cold around here. I know it has snowed. A number of times! But somehow I don't feel winter. I feel spring. It started a few days ago, when I realized that, if I left my window shades up, the sun would wake me up at just the right time. Light. Light! Of course on the first day God said, "Let there be light!" Who would go about creating this and that in pitch darkness? The world craves light. Even night-active creatures actually crave light: why else would they have such huge eyes?!

Pesach happens in the month of Nisan, "b'chodesh ha-Aviv" -in the month of spring. It represents new beginnings, the hope for a future that is bright. Of all the *chagim*, this one has more songs than any other; more than Chanukah, more than Purim. Passover is a feast of song in several languages, in several different musical modes. There are more stories for Passover than for any other holiday. And the most important person at a Passover seder is not Moses (who isn't even named in a traditional haggadah), or Abraham or Pharaoh. The essential person at the seder is a child. Specifically, the youngest child with the capacity to ask questions. Because without the questions, we can't proceed with the story. Without the yearly recitation, "Mah nishtana?" — literally, "What is different?" — we have no reason to go on. The annual seder meal is referenced in Exodus, 12:1-22, but the description is bare-bones. Roast a lamb, banish all chometz, eat matzah together with bitter herbs. And then, in verse 26: "When your children ask you, 'What is this ritual to you?' you shall tell him, 'It is the Passover sacrifice to the Lord, because He passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt when He smote the Egyptians, but saved our houses."

The Torah assumes that there will be a child present, and that the child will ask! In the Mishnah account of the Passover *seder* the child is also there, watching a strange meal — food comes and is taken away! different objects are on the table, foods are dipped into salt water — and of course the child has questions. It's curious that we think of Chanukah or Purim as "kid stuff" but it's really Passover that caters to the attention, the questions, the imagination of a child. Even the tradition of saving the silly songs for the end of the *seder* serves to keep children hanging in there 'til the bitter end!

There is a story that a stranger, wandering through a small town, is invited to join at the seder of a childless couple. They treat him with such hospitality that he asks permission to bless the couple. "May next year's seder be "*ee-seder*" - without or-der!" Such a curious blessing! Shortly thereafter the woman becomes pregnant, and at the following year's Passover *seder* there is a child, reaching for things, disrupting the orderly progression of the *seder*, and generally livening up the joint. Too often we are focused on getting through everything—every word! — of the seder, without regard for the fun, the questions, the digressions that make it all worthwhile.

*Chag Pesach Sameach v'Kasher.* May all your *seders* be *ee-seder*— without order!

## From the Desk of...

### Alan Stern, TBT President Let us not Forget

I was sitting in my office when the news came. February 17, 2010 started out as a cool but sunny day. The skies were clearing for the first time since the blizzard of 2010 and the day was showing promise. And, although the sky was bright, a black cloud rolled into my life when I heard that Anita Resnick passed away.

Anita was a matron of our former Beth Torah Community. Her husband, my friend, Jules, helped to build what is now known as the Roseld Avenue facility. Like Jules, Anita's heart and soul were in our community for most, if not all of her adult life. Anita and I occasionally didn't agree on some things. But as a great Jew and a great community lady, Anita always gave me and inspired in me a sense of mutual respect and esteem, bonded in the service of God and community. I think I speak for many people when I voice my deepest gratitude for the privilege of knowing Anita.

Anita took ill last year, amid the tumult of our unification. I did not get to see Anita in the last few months, partly because she was ill, and partly because I was totally immersed in the process that is bringing Torat EI to reality. I deeply regret not being able to see Anita and to thank her for the privilege of her friendship. In her memory, I offer the following lessons that we can take from this profoundly sad loss.

First, let's be aware that life is short and can be taken from us at any time with no notice. Therefore, as James Taylor sang, shower the people you love with love, show them the way that you feel. Let's not wait for a funeral to realize that we are surrounded by great people and let's not be too busy to remember the people who are so important to us.

Second, let's know that, as Torat El becomes an amazing reality, we will disagree on a few things and tempers may even flare. But let's keep our disagreements constructive, respectful, and mindful that we are all in this together. It's very Jewish to disagree; it is equally Jewish to remain friends even when we disagree.

Finally, let us not forget who we are and why we are Torat El. Our synagogues have been communities of commitment for many generations. Let us be intensely mindful to keep both our ill and healthy brethren not only in our prayers, but also in our actions. Call a temple mate to say hi. Tell someone how much you appreciate them. Visit someone who's ill or down on their luck. Commit a random act of kindness toward a Torat El congregant. These things are easy to do, they have a lot of impact, and they don't hurt! Life is too short to wait to be nice. And a funeral is not the time to declare how much you liked someone.

From the core of my being I extend my heartfelt condolences to Jules, Steve & Diane, Karen & Bill, and Anita's incredible grandchildren. All of us at Torat El stand in your support at this painful moment. It is my heartfelt hope that Anita is looking down with pride on all of us as we work to make Torat El a very special community.

### **Changing Hats to Build Community**

Just as our Unification Agreement explained and our incoming Executive Board concurred, the time felt right to stop talking about it and get on with it. And so, a Nominating Committee comprised of past presidents and Board members selected candidates for Trustees in early January. At the beginning of March, the new Board will be seated, the Steering Committee will be dismantled, and at the end of this month the discharge of old governance and installation of new officers and Trustees will formally take place. Shabbat services on the 26<sup>th</sup> will mark this occasion as well as the official naming of Congregation Torat El. Finally!

Numerous committees, particularly Ritual and Rabbi Search, have been working together for a long time, disregarding heritage ties. Other committees in start-up find that focus is on task; all are thrilled to have more teammates. Those from "both sides" who have had the chance to work together have found levels of energy and commitment stronger than ever. All of us who are here know it's because we really want to be. In the midst of our struggles last year at a TBE Executive Board meeting, past president Les From-kin reminded everyone in the room to "keep your eyes on the prize." Les, a guy who doesn't mince words, was speaking of course, about unification, about not getting distracted by minutiae. The upcoming installation is one more step toward that prize.

Committee development is crucial. We are shopping for a Social Action Chair and members for this important committee. Mitzvah Day is a cornerstone of this committee's work. While the purpose of this committee is to do good through empowerment, only those passionate about activism relating to community needs, the disenfranchised and natural disasters are fulfilled by it. So, it's quite a unique niche.

We also seek a Chair and members for our Israel Affairs committee, as we are eligible for a \$3,000 grant from United Synagogue if we can submit a proposal for an Israel education program by March 22. If you have a keen interest in Israel, this may be just right for you.

Our very important Sunshine & Hesed Committee has a Chair but always seeks to expand! This all-important committee not only visits the sick, it will deliver Kosher Shabbat meals to congregants just home from the hospital. The meals will be funded by our congregant-supported "Helayne Berger Helping Hands Fund." As you can imagine, the committee requires several members so that no one would have meal deliveries more than once a month.

Torat El also needs team members for Membership Outreach, Membership Retention, Fundraising, Special Events, Programming, Adult Education, Marketing & PR committees. Each is unique and important to how fruitfully our new congregation will thrive. "Voice of the Shore," this latest incarnation of our bulletin, is also looking to expand its team. Every committee Chair reports to an Executive Board member who also provides guidance, support and some good ideas. No one gets pushed out on an ice floe here! We're building community and our goal is to make sure it's enjoyable for all who volunteer their precious time. Remember too, that joining a committee is a steppingstone toward becoming a trustee if you want to test the waters of synagogue governance.

# As the new Torat El Board moves forward, we phase out the TBE and TBT Boards. Some congregants leave formal positions of synagogue leadership they have served in with great devotion for many years. We owe them ample gratitude; they gave many of their best years to us.

I also say farewell as the last president of Temple Beth El. Temple Beth El was founded in Asbury Park in 1922, and I am honored to be a part of its history. Just prior to my installation more than a year ago, the Steering Committee advised me of its intent to pursue unification for our two Conservative synagogues. I threw my long-term agenda out the window and concentrated solely on this goal. Now we can build as one community, and for me personally, although our garden is just being planted, I know the roses that will bloom in it one day will be strong, healthy and beautiful.

As I segue into the early days of Torat El's history, I don a new hat as executive vice president. I'll be helping to develop a brand identity for us and create a presence for Torat El's new rabbi in and beyond the Shore area. I am thrilled that finally we can get down to the real work of what I had hoped to do last year – build community by building up committees, each doing what it does best, all interconnected, each connected to the congregation, supporting needs and aspirations. I can't wait to see their work unfold here in these pages. ## Siyyum Bechorim **Calling All First Born (Men and Women)**

### Monday, March 29 at 7:30 a.m. **Roseld Avenue**

According to Jewish law, all Jews who are the first born children of either their father or mother should fast on the day before Passover as an expression of thanks for the deliverance of the first born children of the ancient Israelites from the angel of death. However, individuals who are obligated to fast are exempted from fasting if they have the opportunity to participate in a seudat mitzvah, a festive meal that follows the performance of certain mitzvoth. Therefore, it has become customary for synagogues, on the day before Passover, to make a siyyum, a public completion unit of study, which is followed by a seudat mitzvah, thus exempting the first born participants from their obligation to fast. The siyyum will be preceded by the morning minyan and followed by a feast with lots of delicious chametz. Study and feast is held in memory of Esther and Ed Deitelbaum and is sponsored by their family. All are welcome to join us even if you are not a first born.



## Sale of Chametz

During the week of Pesach, it is forbidden for any Jew to own chametz. To avoid the unnecessary CHOMETZ financial hardship that could result from requiring Jews to dispose of all items that are chametz,



## Café & Conversation...With Bernie Karasic

Here in our "*Kaffeehaus*" we can share a few quiet moments and get acquainted over a cup of coffee. Purim may be over, but the joys of Adar continue through mid-March. So, it's still apropos, as we welcome in Bernard Karasic, for him to dream of his maternal grandmother's *hamantaschen* while he quaffs his hot black java.



Bernie describes her unusual Kiev recipe as tri-corner Danish pastries filled with *mohn*, sweetened poppy seed filling. Occasionally, prune jam would substitute. "There was nothing like them," he reminisces. (If anyone has such a recipe, please contact the office so we can bake a batch for Bernie!)

Bernie served as president of Temple Beth El from 1975 through 1978, a critical point in the congregation's transition from Asbury Park to Oakhurst. "We bought the lot in the early 70's and started construction in '71-'72," Bernie explains. "I was vice president and very active on the building committee. When we moved in, we weren't finished with the building. The first year of my term, I took over [for the sitting president] and handled the rest of the construction," he relates. He was elected to serve a full term following that first crazy year.

As in any transition, there was drop-off in the congregation, Bernie says. "Some wanted to stay in Asbury. We really had quite a complex there." Envisioning the future is always a challenge, he admits, but the congregation was committed to its new home.

Bernie's younger daughter Lisa was the first *bat mitzvah* in the new sanctuary, which was far from complete. "We put folding chairs on the cement floors, and then we'd move the chairs out after the weekend so the construction workers could continue their work," Bernie explains, as someone's who'd literally been there from the ground up. When the biggest decision that has to be made is a color scheme, just imagine what it was like with no carpet.

But, we're jumping the gun. Asbury Park born and bred, Bernie served in the Pacific Theater with the Navy during World War II, aboard the aircraft carrier *USS Bonhomme Richard*. A proud alumnus of Ursinus College in the Valley Forge/King of Prussia area outside Philadelphia, Bernie studied business and political science in preparation for law. He later went to Seton Hall University Law School and would ultimately build a career in commercial real estate and land use and development. But again, let's not jump the gun.

While Bernie was getting his general law practice up and running in Asbury, local matchmaker Toby Stevens was walking her fingers through The Yellow Pages. It seems that young married Shore resident Judy Emhoff was awaiting a visit from her single sister, Renee Posner, from Maplewood. Judy and Renee's parents thought a weekend down the Shore would be a perfect getaway for Renee while on a weekend break from elite women's college Cedar Crest in Allentown PA. But, Renee had to have a "proper" date.

So, matchmaker Toby was consulted. She decided a nice lawyer would be appropriate. She did what any enterprising matchmaker would do – she consulted The Yellow Pages. When Bernie's listing jumped off the page, it was an "a-ha" moment; Toby already knew Bernie. She felt certain "I would make a great date for Renee," Bernie explains matter-of-factly. The match "took;" they married a year later and will celebrate their 53<sup>rd</sup> anniversary this July.

Raising a family (he and Renee also have an older daughter, Donna) while he built his Asbury Park law firm into a commercial law and land use development practice, Bernie worked with his younger brother Harold. He grew his staff to nine lawyers and 20 support personnel. In 1971, he built the Poplar Brook Building on Monmouth Road and moved his practice there -- just down the street from the site of Temple Beth El – which explains how Bernie was able to keep his eye on the construction of the building. Bernie is the man behind the building, so to speak.

Sadly, Bernie's brother Harold passed away at age 47, in 1982. Bernie ran his practice in the Poplar Brook Building for almost 30 years, dissolving the firm in 2000. For the past decade he has practiced in West Long Branch, dueting with Arnold Levin, limiting his work for select clients in commercial real estate, land use development, planning, and zoning. More recently, Bernie's sister Eleanor Gould has returned to the Shore area and has also become a Torat El congregant.

Bernie offers perspective on the challenge that Congregation Torat EI faces as unification proceeds. "The move from Asbury was a very exciting time for us," he recounts. "Problems we faced then were the exact problems TBE and TBT faced in deciding to unify -- perhaps not so acute, but similar." Bernie explains, "Some of us came to the realization that we couldn't continue the way we were, despite our roster of congregants. It was becoming apparent that our Conservative TBE congregation wouldn't continue to exist forever on its own. Demographics had begun to change – and this was 40 years ago!"

"Now you're faced with 'What will happen here?' because we're not building out at the Shore, people aren't flocking in, the Sephardic community has established a strong base, so we [Conservative Jews] have to keep working at it, to make what we have last," he muses. Bernie observes that many young people are flocking to Modern Orthodoxy while Conservative Jews are being drawn to "the Chabadniks – those guys are smart," referring to marketing techniques employed by Chabad. But a bright note, he says, is that even his alma mater, Ursinus College, founded by the German Reformed Church (now the United Church of Christ), has a Hillel chapter. "If someone told me that could ever happen!" Bernie laughs at the enlightenment on campus.

"We can't do anything [about the community around us]," Bernie says, "and the unification doesn't contribute to the *growth* of Conservative Judaism *per se*, but *why* we're doing it – it's to ensure that we've done our best to make a future for our kids." Bernie's take on things is that quality, not quantity, will keep us strong, and he feels our new rabbi will have to rise to the challenge of making us strong. That is exactly what Torat El's marketing plan will count on to draw unaffiliated families and reach out to new families from farther afield.

History has great meaning to this man who has seen the world change so much in his lifetime. As for the synagogue community in which he has played such a vital role, he offers these words: "What we're doing may be distasteful to some, but it must be done. I hope the result is a renewed Conservative congregation that will last much, much longer than either could have on its own." Such would be a fit-ting legacy for this congregational president who saw the handwriting on the wall forty years ago. ~ Maddy Cohen

On March 6, I will follow in the tradition of thousands before me as I become a Bat Mitzvah. 


## Bar Mitzvah Project
