From The Rabbi's Study...

Walls of Welcome

Shalom. In just a few weeks Jews around the world will begin celebrating the festival of *Sukkot*. Sukkot is a time when we build temporary dwelling places outside our homes as a reminder



of our people's wanderings in the desert without shelter or protection. By observing the mitzvah of "dwelling" in this temporary structure on Sukkot, we recognize the fragility of life's journey as we recall these wanderings of our biblical ancestors.

As we build the walls of our Sukkah and gather the four species together, our tradition reminds us that the fragility of life is not to be faced alone. Unlike the permanent structures of our everyday homes, the walls of the Sukkah are not meant to keep anyone out, but rather are built with the intention of inviting the outside world in. When we dwell in our sukkkot, it is customary to invite guests to eat, pray, and celebrate with us. Additionally, there is a kabbalistic custom from Safed of inviting ushpizin, symbolic quests, into our Sukkah each day. Traditionally, these quests were Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron and David who were invited in to the Sukkah, and recently many Jews have begun inviting our matriarchs and other important Jewish women into the Sukkah as well. Many people hang posters of these figures in their Sukkah as a reminder of the welcoming nature of this holiday. Some people also symbolically invite family and friends who cannot be with them by hanging pictures of them in their Sukkah.

The gathering of the four species also reminds us that we must strive to be universally welcoming and open to all who wish to enter our Sukkah and our lives. The *Midrash* teaches that there are four types of Jews represented by the four kinds of species used on Sukkot [*etrog* (citron), *lulav* (palm), *hadasim* (myrtle), *aravot* (willow)].

The willow has no taste and cannot be smelled. This is like the Jew who learns no Torah and performs no mitzvoth. The myrtle branch can be smelled but has no taste. This is like the Jew who knows little Torah but still does many mitzvoth. The palm branch has a taste but no smell. This is like the Jew who knows much Torah but does not do mitzvoth. The citron can be both smelled and tasted. This is like the Jew who knows much Torah and does mitzvoth. (Vayikrah Rabbah 30:12)

By binding these species together on Sukkot, we are reminded that we must constantly strive to be welcoming towards all Jews. Additionally, the many Jewish traditions concerning welcoming the stranger remind us that we must be welcoming to everyone outside of our tradition as well.

In addition to the values of communal celebration, welcoming, and inclusivity, Sukkot also forces us to open up walls that we have built during the year and recognize the need for unity. The world is too fragile to go it alone. In the words of Rabbi Nina Beth Cardin:

Sukkot reminds us that ultimate security is found not within the walls of our home but in the presence of God and one another.... The walls of our sukkot may make us vulnerable, but they make us available, too, to receive the kindness and the support of one another, to hear when another calls out in need, to poke our heads in to see whether anybody is up for a chat and a cup of coffee...Sukkot reminds us that freedom is enjoyed best not when we are hidden away behind our locked doors but rather when we are able to open our homes and our hearts to one another (The Tapestry of Jewish Time, 86-87.)

In other words, Sukkot helps us to learn how to reconnect and deepen our connections with God and with one another.

In Tractate *Sukkot* of the Babylonian Talmud, Rabbi Eliezer taught that the Sukkah represents God's sheltering presence. As the year 5771 begins, may we be blessed to feel God's presence in our lives as we connect to one another by both "inviting and uniting" during this holiday, and throughout the rest of the year. I pray that we all have the courage to continually incorporate these lessons of openness and unity into our personal lives and into the life of our Torat El community.

Hag Sameach! Have a joyous and meaningful Sukkot!

Local Cantors Assembly Member Recognized for Continued Learning

At this year's convention, held in New York City, the Cantors Assembly, the world's largest organization of professional hazzanim serving congregations primarily in North America and Europe, recognized **Cantor Marcia Lane** along with other members for achievements in continuing education. Lane received certification as a Cantors Assembly Scholar, having invested more than 36 hours in advanced studies.

"Many of our leaders have felt that we needed to create a system to spur our members to continue their learning in varied disciplines in their communities -- that this continuing education is vital to their long-term success in their positions, and to furthering the accomplishments of cantors throughout the synagogue communities," noted Cantor Jack Chomsky of Columbus, Ohio, the Assembly's Senior Vice President, who helped format the policy along with Hazzan Rebecca Carmi, Director of Special Projects for the Assembly, Hazzan Mimi Haselkorn, Chair of the Education Committee, and the members of the Education Committee.

The newly formed program states that "a Hazzan is never finished learning - it is vital to our success in our congregations and communities, and to our personal health and well-being, to take advantage of opportunities to study, learn and grow - locally and nationally - as well as internationally."

Participating members (over 2 dozen were recognized at the Convention) logged in hours on a specially designed portion of the Cantors Assembly website. Those who logged in 18 hours received certificates recognizing them as CA Advanced Learners. Those who logged in 36 hours were recognized as CA Scholars.

"We were really thrilled with the first-year participation in the program," noted Haselkorn. Commented Carmi, "We look forward to the day that all our members will spend the time and achieve the growth that helps to ensure a brighter future for them."

Lane remarked that she has always pursued studies in Jewish texts as well as in history and music. "It never occurred to me that I was finished learning when I was ordained."

Activities recognized for log-in hours included Cantors Assembly National Conference Sessions, Cantors Assembly Regional Conference Programs, North American Jewish Choral Festival, Institute for Jewish Spirituality, Nosh-N-Drosh Conference Call Learning, local text study, voice and instrumental lessons and more.

Cantor Lane also took classes in Talmud and Jewish Codes. She will be moving to Riverdale in the Bronx to pursue her rabbinic studies at the Academy for Jewish Religion, the world's oldest transdenominational rabbinic and cantorial seminary. Café & Conversation With Neil Weitzenkorn

With the High Holy Days imminent, it seemed apropos to invite Ritual co-chair Neil Weitzenkorn into our Kaffehaus for some "coffee talk," both about himself and the hard work of the Ritual Committee.



To set the mood for our "Kaffeehaus" topics, which range from the arts to religion to personal challenges, imagine Neil sipping a mocha *frappucino*, which, he says, always energizes him. He said that anything chocolate – cake, cheesecake, and particularly the Salt Creek Grille's warm Chocolate Ganache Soufflé, would be the perfect accompaniment. I had to promise Neil a homemade chocolate espresso cheesecake when I learned we are fellow chocaholics!

Neil grew up in Yonkers, NY in what he refers to as a "Conservadox" *shul,* which "my mother dragged me to every Shabbat," he recalls with the tone of someone who hated his youthful predicament but has now seen the light. He attended Hebrew School "weekdays and Sundays, the same type of setup as here, at the synagogue's height," he explains.

After becoming a *bar mitzvah* on Memorial Day weekend, "I dropped out [of synagogue life] two weeks later, and my parents couldn't BRIBE me to go back," chuckles Neil.

While his mother continued to attend *shul* religiously, Neil worked for his father on weekends in the family business. His rejection of a Jewish lifestyle continued while he received his education in the growing field of computer science.

In 1974, "Continental Insurance [on the corner of Green Grove Rd., Neptune] presented me with an opportunity here," explains Neil, who moved into the Middlebrook Apartments and married his then fiance Marcia that year also. Eventually, they would move to their present home in Wanamassa.

Neil began his career as a programmer/analyst trainee in the specialized field of auto insurance. Over 19 years with Continental, he advanced to Systems Analyst, Sr. Analyst, Supervisor, Staff Consultant and ultimately, Sr. Consultant.

His 3.5-mile daily commute was a pleasure for all those years, but in 1993, Neil switched jobs and began work for two and a half years at a consulting firm 100 miles away, in Valley Forge PA. He says his trusty '93 Honda Civic has been his reliable companion through all 184,000 miles he's put on it since those days.

As a programming analysis specialist on IBM AS400 computers, Neil "bounced around" for several years, first to East Brunswick, then elsewhere. He then settled in at his current position with a commercial insurance company specializing in utility companies such as Con Edison, with liability limits of \$35 million. Based in East Rutherford, Neil got to watch the old Giants' Stadium come down.

So, what brought Neil back into the synagogue? It was "my girls who got me back into Judaism. When they started Sunday School, I got involved. Their education became my re-education." He has since served as Education Committee Chair, on Men's Club board, and Men's Club President, prior to serving as Ritual Chair of heritage TBT, and now as co-Chair of Ritual at CTE.

"Marcia and I really lucked out," Neil confides with fatherly pride. "Our girls, Rachel and Sara, both married phenomenal guys who share my warped sense of humor." He waxes poetic about his family, especially his grandkids, Ariella, 4½ and Zachary, 2: "Anyone who knows me knows they are the two individuals who make me smile and laugh and have a good time. If you see me 'down,' just ask to see a photo of my grandkids and I'll start smiling." Fortunately his girls live in the area, so Shabbat dinner is a family affair.

Neil's other great passion is reading. He loves science fiction, especially by Isaac Asimov, and thriller novels by Brad Thor, Nelson De-Mille and Tom Clancy.

A love for science fiction goes beyond reading. If you were playing "Truth or Dare" with Neil, he would admit that he is a "Trekker," a devoted "Star Trek" fan, who has attended conventions, acquired collectibles, and even worked in a visit to The Star Trek Experience in Vegas a few years ago when he and Marcia were there for a business conference.

"Hobbies are one thing, obsessions are something else," Neil says, explaining his Trekker behavior. In fact, his license plate reads 2BLDYGO – "To Boldly Go..." – the first part of the opening mission statement of original episodes of the "Star Trek" television series. ("To Boldly Go Where No Man Has Gone Before" concluded an opening that begins "Space: the Final Frontier...).

If Neil could actually be any character in "Star Trek," he'd be Scotty, the flight engineer. "I do many repair jobs around the house and for my kids, from electrical, to plumbing, to construction. Generally, if something's not working, I can fix it," notes Neil.

The series inspired Neil to attend NASA Space Camp in Huntsville, AL a decade ago, where he did "all sorts of neat stuff such as pilot a flight simulator and simulate an escape from a helicopter during a lake drop." His thirst for the sky was still not quenched and about five years ago, on a whim, he drove to Allaire Airport and took a flying lesson, during which his instructor took him as far north as 79th Street in Manhattan. As Neil was driving home, Marcia called, and when he relayed his adventure, "it wasn't a pretty sight!" The lesson, says Neil, "was a one-time only."

As Ritual Co-Chair, Neil said that his committee will be working with Rabbi Schonbrun through the next year to make his transition as easy as possible. The major task of Ritual over the past few months has been "reconciling different traditions of our family's two branches," which will now, Neil believes, ensure Rabbi Schonbrun's ability to "appeal to everybody and be successful in his efforts."

"My hope is to see Conservative Judaism flourish in the Shore area ...and that won't happen unless everyone sees with common eyes...and embraces the idea that the needs of the many must outweigh the needs of the few, or the one. "

Beam us up, Scotty. There's work to be done.

New Initiative for 3rd-6th Grade Students

In an effort to continue to maximize student learning while meeting the needs of our Synagogue families, a new program is being put in place for 3rd-6th grade students beginning September 2010. This initiative involves the creation of Bonus Service Credits that will allow students to earn bonus credits for attending additional services above the core requirement, and to use the bonus credits as a 'pass' for an excused absence from Religious School. Here is how it will work:

Core Service Attendance Requirements: These requirements remain unchanged: 3 for 3rd Graders, 4 for 4th Graders, 5 for 5th Graders, and 6 for 6th Graders. These Service requirements can be achieved by attending Shabbat (Friday or Saturday) and/or Jewish Holidays (other than Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur), and by attending Junior Congregation services.

Bonus Service Credits: Once the Core Service Requirements have already been met, a student's continued attendance at Services will result in bonus service credits to earn a Religious School Attendance "Pass". One Pass will be earned for each service (Shabbat, Holiday, and Junior Congregation service) that is attended up and above the Core Service Requirement. A student may use that pass as an excused absence on a Sunday, Monday, or Wednesday that he/she misses class. Each bonus service credit may be used as one pass. Of course, students will still be responsible for the work that he/she misses in class. A Bonus Service Credit can only be used for a regular Religious School day. It may not be utilized to replace a Family Education workshop.

Please note that the Service requirements for students within one year of their Bar/Bat Mitzvah will remain at 3 per month.

Note: Attendance will be taken following services. An index card file with the names of the students will be on the Bima. It will be the responsibility of each child to ascend the Bima following services to move his/her index card to the front of the card file in order to receive credit. You may also inform me of your child's attendance at services by emailing me at <u>benlaskowitz@yahoo.com</u> during the week following your child's attendance.
