We Are All Renters



The other day I was reading an article in *Time Magazine* about Greta Thunberg, their choice for the 2019 Person of the Year. Thunberg, a teenager who helped spark/re-ignite a global climate change movement by camping out in front of the Swedish parliament holding a sign that said "School strike for climate," has since addressed heads of state at the U.N., met with the Pope, argued with the President of the United States, and inspired 4 million people to join the global climate strike on September 20, 2019. Quite a list of accomplishments for a 16-year-old. While the climate conference held in Madrid this past December did not lead to global consensus on the many issues related to climate change, scientists and environmental activists are warning that the global rise in temperature due to greenhouse gas emissions has the potential to rise 1.5 degrees Celsius, exposing 350 million people to drought and

pushing roughly 120 million people into poverty by 2030. (https://time.com/person-of-the-year-2019-greta-thunberg/) As Jews, this is an issue that we ought to care about, taking whatever steps necessary to both educate ourselves about these issues and take action when possible. In just a few weeks, on February 10, we will be celebrating the holiday of Tu B'Shevat. Tu B'Shevat literally refers to the 15th day of the month of Shevat, and was originally a date intended to help farmers follow certain agricultural laws discussed in the Torah. The rabbis designated this date and called it a "birthday" for the all trees. Throughout the years, however, Tu B'Shevat has evolved and been influenced by a variety of Jewish values and beliefs ranging from Mysticism to Zionism to Ecology. The environmental importance of this day that has been emphasized over the past few decades is one that is deeply "rooted" in our tradition which teaches that when it comes to our time on this earth, we are really all simply renters.

Since the biblical period, it has been a religious belief that there is no such thing as human "ownership." The words of the Pslamist teach that "The Earth is the Eternal One's and all that it holds, the world and its inhabitants (Psalms 24:1)." In other words, each one of us is blessed to be a tenant on this earth and we should approach this role in a responsible way. From the Jewish perspective it is the height of hubris to claim that the earth is ours and that we can do with it as we see fit. And yet, while most people in this world might not actually come out with such an explicit proclamation, this is unfortunately how we often behave. Last summer, I read a book entitled *Falter*, by Bill McKibben, about the frightening state of affairs when it comes to climate change. He wrote:

Those of us in the fossil fuel-consuming classes, have, over the last two hundred years, dug up immense quantities of coal and gas and oil, burned them; in car motors, basement furnaces, power plants, and steel mills. When we burn them, the carbon atoms combine with oxygen atoms in the air to produce carbon dioxide. The molecular structure of carbon dioxide traps heat that would otherwise have radiated back into space. We have, in other words, changed the energy balance of our planet, the amount of the sun's heat that is returned to space. The scale of this change is the problem... The extra heat that we trap near the planet because of the carbon dioxide we've spewed is equivalent to the heat from 400,000 Hiroshima-sized bombs every day, or four each second!""... In 2015 study, the Journal of Mathematical Biology pointed out that if the world's oceans kept warming by 2100 they might become hot enough to "stop oxygen production by phytoplankton by disrupting the process of photosynthesis." Given that two thirds of the oxygen comes from phytoplankton-that would 'likely result in the mass mortality of humans and animals..." (21,34)

It is the scale of the problem that activists like Thunberg and authors like McKibben are trying to get us to understand. And while this information may make many of us want to throw up our hands in an overwhelmed state of exhaustion, Judaism does not give us that luxury. As Rabbi Tarfon taught: *We are not obligated to complete the task, but neither are we free to ignore it* (Avot 2:21).

So what can we do about these challenges? First, we can educate ourselves about the steps we can take, even the seemingly small ones, to make a difference. There are the basic things such as leaving the water running too long, using too many paper towels, not being careful about recycling, not using environmentally friendly light bulbs in our homes, wasting gas, and discarding our electronics in an unsafe manner. Then there are considerations about the way that we discard our trash at home, the way that we travel, the way that we eat and the foods that we consume. Many of these habits have a direct impact on our environment and many of these habits are hard for us to even consider changing. And yet when Tu B'Shevat comes back around, we are reminded that we must try. We must do something. As the midrash taught:

In the hour when the Holy One created the first human being, God took the person before all the trees of the garden of Eden, and said to the person: "See my works, how fine and excellent they are! Now all that I have created, for you I have created. Think upon this, and do not corrupt and desolate my world for if you corrupt it, there will be no one to set it right after you. **Kohelet Rabbah 7:13**

Echoing this text (*though they may not know that!*), the majority of the mainstream scientific community and environmental activists around the world are sounding the alarm. As we reach what we are being told over and over again is a critical moment, the question for each one of us as individuals is whether or not we are paying attention. From our homes, to our places of work, to our voting choices, this is an issue that our tradition tells us *must matter*. For we are simply renters – and as such, we have a responsibility to the ultimate land Lord of the world to ensure that this majestic and wondrous creation continues to exists for future generations and beyond.

He is a frequent commentator and writer on refugee issues on television, radio, newspapers, and other media outlets. In November 2016, the Forward, the leading national Jewish weekly in the United States, named Mark to its *Forward 50*, the list of Jews who have "impacted American life" in 2016.



Greetings!

I hope you are all having a good and healthy winter and are staying warm.

I recently returned from a lovely vacation in Barbados with my family. Along with the wonderful weather, picture-perfect beaches and historic sites, there was the Nidhe Israel Synagogue in Bridgetown. We attended Friday night Shabbat services at this Conservative synagogue, located on aptly named Synagogue Lane. It is the oldest Jewish congregation in the Western Hemisphere and was formed by the Sephardic Jewish settlers who left Brazil in the 1620's and introduced sugar cane to Barbados. An 1831 hurricane destroyed the original synagogue, which was then rebuilt in 1833 and restored in 1989. It is currently owned by the Barbados National Trust, which initially wanted to raze the building and erect a courthouse, but due to the petitioning by the local Jewish community, it was returned to be used as a synagogue.

In Barbados there are approximately 50 full-time residents in the Jewish community that have come from a half dozen countries. In the winter, the number of attendees at Friday night services increases with the arrival of snowbirds and tourists. Interestingly, the synagogue name means "Synagogue of the Scattered of Israel."

We arrived shortly before the 6:30pm service and had a chance to speak to the Rabbi. I was pleased to learn that they allow women to count for a minyan and female congregants can get an aliyah. The Rabbi is from London and comes to Barbados for the winter to not only enjoy the beautiful warm weather, but to also conduct the weekly Friday night service. We then met the current President of the synagogue who introduced us to other worshippers.

It was so enjoyable speaking with many of the 30+ attendees that evening. Everyone was so warm and welcoming to us, even though we were only there for one Shabbat.

I continually thought about our warm, friendly and inviting environment at Congregation Torat El. It's so nice to be greeted at the door with a genuine smile. Although we are spread around the world, the Jewish community is still a close-knit group – you never know who you will meet that will be connected to your background and experiences. One worshipper we spoke with was a Rabbi from Long Island vacationing in Barbados for three weeks. It turns out that one of the families of his congregation, with whom he is very close, has a daughter who studied in Israel for a semester of college with my daughter!

Just as you look forward to greeting the regulars and the visitors each week, we should continually strive to be welcoming to all who walk through our doors.

All of the kids there were very sweet and polite, as was the manager of the building. She was very kind to me and she cared very much about the children.

The second organization that I participated in is called Backpack Crew, which is an organization that raises money to fill backpacks with food for children. I found out that a few girls in my grade were participating in the organization so I asked if there was any way I could help. They asked if I could bring a creative aspect to the project. I was able to make necklaces and then sell them at a stand at our Shrewsbury 5K. I was able to sell most of my necklaces. All of the money that we made went to Backpack Crew.

The reason I chose these two organizations is because it has always bothered me thinking about families not being able to put food on the dinner table. I enjoyed helping these people and it has made an impact on my life.
