TURNING THE PAGE AND WRITING IN OUR BOOK OF LIFE



Shalom. I hope you are all enjoying a wonderful summer and appreciating the many blessings of gathering, being outside, beginning to see family and friends, and generally enjoying life on the Jersey Shore in a way that we have been unable to for quite some time. With COVID-19 numbers decreasing and our lives starting to progress back to some type of "new normal," it is hard to believe that we are only one month away from Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (yes, they come "early" this year!).

I have been thinking a lot about these upcoming holiest of holidays this year, not just from a logistical angle, but also from the deeper meaning and opportunity that they provide us as we continue through this *re-entry* phase of the global pandemic. There is a haunting text that we have all come to understand too well over this past year and a half that is found in our High

Holiday liturgy. Written with the classical imagery of three books that are open before the heavenly court as God "sits in judgment" over us, this metaphor expresses the belief that God ultimately determines who will live and who will die as we approach a new year. During these Yamim Noraim, these days of awe, we are either written in the Book of Life, the Book of Death, or the In-Between book, and we spend time trying to see if we can "annul the severity of the decree" through our prayer and through our actions. This imagery is explicitly expressed in the Unetaneh Tokef prayer that begins the Musaf service. We read:

On Rosh Hashanah it is written, and on the Yom Kippur it is sealed! How many will pass on, and how many will be born; who will live and who will die; who will live a long life and who will come to an untimely end; who will perish by fire, and who by water; who by sword and who by beast; who by hunger; and who by thirst; who by earthquake, and who by plague...

Each person's origin is dust and each person will return to the earth having spent life seeking sustenance. Scripture compares human beings to a broken shard, withering grass, a shriveled flower, a passing shadow, a fading cloud, a fleeting breeze, scattered dust, a vanishing dream.

Life is ever so fragile. And we are not really completely in charge. Isn't that a feeling that we can all identify with after a year and a half of experiencing a global pandemic?

And yet. And yet we are reminded that our choices, how we live, our willingness to return (*teshuvah*), to develop our faith (*tefilah*), to engage in acts of justice and charity (*tzedakah*), can influence God's decision and "annul the severity of the decree." And yet we are reminded that it is not God who writes our signature in these books, it is each one of us, through our daily choices and actions. Going back to the introduction of the *Unetaneh Tokef*:

You recall all that is forgotten, and will open the book of remembrance, which speaks for itself, for our own hands have signed the page...

It was the Slonim Rebbe, Rabbi Sholom Noach Berezovsky, a 20th Century Hasidic Rabbi, who pointed out the phrase "chotam yad kol adam bo" (the signature of each person is in it) reminds us that we are the signatories to our own story. While God is understood to be the ultimate judge and jury, we do seem to have some power, and some control, over the influence the direction of our own lives and our own stories take. And it is that control that I have been thinking about.

Yes, life is so unpredictable. As we approach these High Holidays, many of us are missing loved ones; many of us have experienced tragedy and loss; many of us no longer have friends or family with us this year due to COVID-19. We have been through so much. It has been painful. It has been traumatic. And along comes this Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, with the awareness that indeed we have been living through one long Yom Kippur moment for over a year and a half. But what did we learn? What did we learn about just how precious life is? What did we do about the control that we *do have* in this world? And can we take a moment to ask ourselves what signature we want to put in our own Books of Life this year?

For many of us, this year and a half of COVID-19 has forced us to prioritize different things in our lives: our relationships, the way that we spend our time, the way that we choose to care for, or neglect, our physical, spiritual, and emotional well-beings. What life choices did you make during COVID-19, and how are you going to take them with you into this New Year? What do you want your signature in your Book of Life to look like in 5782? What are you going to do differently, what habits are you going to change, and what is something that you are "never going back to doing" as we begin to move out of the darkness and into the light?

A New Year is upon us – a gift that for some of us will be appreciated this year like no other. *Life is like a passing shadow, a fleeting breeze.* What are the concrete things that we are going to do this year to make sure that we hold on, for dear life, to the preciousness of living that we have been granted?

I am so very much looking forward to seeing many of you over these High Holidays and wish you all a shanah tovah u'metukah, a good and sweet new year.

אנחנו כאן - We are Here

The past year has presented all of us with many challenges. The COVID-19 pandemic disrupted what had been our "normal" life. Through the confusion, fear, and grief, our Congregation has remained strong and our members engaged in new ways.

We have added "virtual" and "hybrid" events to our programming, finding new ways to be together. We will continue to incorporate these new modes of connection as we move forward.

As we explore our "new normal," let us acknowledge that אנחנו כאן - Anachnu Ca'an - we are here.

We – Congregation Torat El – have been and remain **here** as a place and community for learning, for prayer, for support in challenging times and for celebration for better times.

We – your lay leadership – **are here** working with our fellow congregants and our staff to advance our congregation's mission and goals.

We – our committees, auxiliaries and volunteers – **are here** providing programming and events.

We – Rabbi Schonbrun, Pam Cardullo, Ben Laskowitz, Joanne Bass, Lisa Arnold, and our new Director of Youth Education and Engagement, Rachel Weitzenkorn – **are here** expanding on our collective experiences as a Kehilla Kedosha – holy community.

As always, your Congregation is here for you.

We look forward to your suggestions and feedback including how we can improve, or on new program ideas. YOUTH EDUCATION AND ENGAGEMENT

It is with great pride that I write to you today as the new Director of Youth Education and Engagement of CTE. I am excited to bring my background from learning at Boston University, Gratz College, Rutgers University, and the NJEXCEL Principal Leadership program, as well as my professional experience with Jewish Family & Children's Service of Greater Mercer County and Jewish Renaissance Foundation in Perth Amboy to our congregation. As someone who received her religious school education at Temple Beth Torah, and then went on to serve as a teacher's aide, teacher, Youth Group (Kadima/USY) leader, and High Holy Days Youth Coordinator with Temple Beth Torah and Congregation Torat El, this is a complete full-circle moment of "L'Dor V'Dor."

We have learned a great deal about what makes solid, meaningful Jewish learning during the pandemic, which has helped inform how to meet the needs of our students' strengths and their individualized areas of potential growth. Our staff and lay leadership have been working behind the scenes to gear up for the upcoming school year. We are optimistic about the opportunities that will be offered to our students. Our CTE Youth Education and Programming has undergone some impressive changes while maintaining our core values of engagement, education, and enrichment. To that end, I'd like to share some of what our students will encounter this year:

Youth Education Structure:

Our <u>Ganon-7th grade</u> students will experience hands-on, curriculum rich, Judaic focused opportunities, including:

- Shabbat School Program 9:00-11:30am (2-3 times per month) IN PERSON focusing on socialization, youthonly prayer time, small group learning about holidays, traditions, and more, and main congregation service participation
- Friday Night Service (time TBD, 1 time per month) IN PERSON rotating between a youth-only service and main congregation service participation
- Family Education Programs and/or Social Action Programs (time TBD, quarterly) IN PERSON focusing on hands-on activities related to holidays, mitzvot, and more
- Special holiday programs (examples include High Holy Days Youth Services, Simchat Torah event, Purim Carnival, and more)
- Grades 3-7 will participate in a small group virtual instruction during the week for 30-45 minutes, 3-4 times per month. The date will be determined by the teacher based upon individualized needs. This time will focus on Hebrew reading, prayer, and other topics that lend themselves to the students' academic profile and curricular standards.
- Ben Laskowitz with conduct pre-Bar/Bat Mitzvah sessions with our 6th graders
- Our library experience will be enhanced for our younger students

Our <u>High School students</u> will experience leadership opportunities as well as real-life preparation as they become young adults, including:

- Social Action/Tikkun Olam/Mitzvot Program: Sundays 10:00-11:30am or 2:00-3:30pm as times may vary, (1 time per month) IN PERSON, where students will participate in hands-on activities to help our local community and larger Jewish community world-wide
- Kadima/USY regional events (as determined via the calendar) IN PERSON
- Hebrew High sessions with Rabbi, Rachel Weitzenkorn, or other guests: Wednesdays (2 times per month) VIRTUAL
- Teacher's Aide (Madrichim) Program: Supporting teachers during the Shabbat School Program 9:00-11:30am (2-3 times per month) IN PERSON, Friday Night Service (time TBD, 1 time per month) IN PERSON, and Family Education Programs and/or Social Action Programs (time TBD, quarterly) IN PERSON
- Special holiday programs (examples include High Holy Days Youth Services, Simchat Torah event, Purim Carnival, and more)


