FROM HAMAN TO HAYOM (TODAY)



In a few weeks we will be celebrating the Festival of Purim. Often packaged as a fun and joyous holiday filled with fun and food, at first glance, Purim might not seem like a very serious holiday. But as the story unfolds, and as we prepare for the festival itself, it becomes clear that there is a much darker and more serious aspect of Purim than first meets the eye. Beginning with the Shabbat that immediately precedes Purim, Shabbat Zachor, the Shabbat of Remembrance, we begin to realize that the focus on Purim centers on those who have historically wished the Jewish people harm. From the biblical tribe of Amalek, (an ancient people who staged a sneak attack against the Israelites, attacking from the rear), to Haman (a descendant of Amalek), to Hitler, to the anti-Semites of today, Purim is a festival that reminds us of the dangers of being overly comfortable in society. It is a painful thing to write, and a tremendously difficult concept to acknowledge, but it is around this time of year in particular that we are being asked to remember.

that as a people, we have always faced persecution, we have always faced hatred, we have always faced Amalek. And yet, despite all of our challenges, we are still here, with a collective obligation, rooted in our history as a people, to somehow (in the spirit of topsy-turvy Purim) turn this hatred upside down.

As I have written in recent months elsewhere, from disturbing political rhetoric using Holocaust imagery and figures, to shootings and threats against synagogues, to the banning of books teaching about the Holocaust (Maus), to anti-Semitism guised as unfair and unreasonable criticism of Israel, we are living through a phenomena that most of us had naively hoped was a "thing of the past" in America. Historically we have understood that whenever division and hatred in a society rear their ugly head, hatred of the Jew is not far behind. From Pharaoh to Haman to Hitler, that has been true – and, unfortunately, it remains true to this day.

Purim comes to remind us that despite this harsh reality, and despite any rational explanation for it (read Lipstadt, <u>Antisemitism: Here and Now</u>), we must never tire from fighting the Hamans of this world, and bearing witness to the existence of anti-Semitism in this world. Why is the Shabbat before Purim called a Shabbat of *remembrance?* Why is the mitzvah of the Megillah reading *to listen* to the story? Because we are called to remember, to pay attention, to never forget that which has always existed – senseless hatred of the Jewish people. The lesson is simple — we can never hope to eradicate this type of hatred; we can never hope to promote peace, respect and tolerance for *all* of God's creatures, regardless of race, religion, political persuasion, sexual orientation, etc. if we do not first understand, acknowledge and speak out against those who would seek to do us harm.

This is not a pleasant task. It is not something that we enjoy thinking about. But it is a responsibility that we bear as members of the Jewish people. Many of us have relatives (perhaps distant at this point) who perished or survived the Holocaust. Many of us have heard direct testimony from survivors. All of us have seen the movies, heard the testimony, visited the museums, read the books, and perhaps even visited some of the concentration camps themselves. As the last survivors begin to fade away, we must not relegate the terrors of anti-Semitic rhetoric and action, direct or indirect, intentional or ignorant, to the bin or our collective history. The dangers of anti-Semitism, which is to say simply "Jew hatred," cannot be overstated – something that I understood very clearly as a young twenty-something standing at the gates of Auschwitz and in a gas chamber of Majdonek. It is true that our entire Jewish identity cannot, and should not, be based on the Holocaust alone. We have too much collective and sacred wisdom over thousands of years to let our identity be defined by the hatred of "the other" towards us. But while our Jewish identities *must* be about much more than ant-Semitism, these past few years have reminded us that Amalek and Haman are still alive and well. As Jews, regardless of our political persuasion or opinions about Israeli or American politics, we cannot allow this to be tolerated or accepted in our society.

So what are we to do? In general, we must speak up against intolerance, hatred, and bigotry of any kind. Megilat Esther reminds us that it only takes one drunken ruler, a crazed villain and an apathetic society for things to go wrong very quickly – and hatred of the Jew is never far behind.

Second, we must never tire of learning our facts and history, no matter how graphic and disturbing they might be, when it comes to anti-Semitism. We must educate ourselves, support institutions that dedicate their work to this issue, teach our children and grandchildren the upsetting parts of our history, while simultaneously showing them what it means to live their lives as proud Jews. This is a tall order, but it leads me to my final point for the moment.

What is the biggest way that we can combat anti-Semitism? *By learning, living, and practicing our Judaism.* Jewish life and living can be countercultural. It is not always easy to stand apart from the crowd, to eat a certain way, pray a certain way, live by a certain ethical code, to mark time in a certain way. But to be Jewish is to be unafraid to stand apart. Esther is our shining star amidst all of this hatred. Reluctant at first, and happy to remain hidden (*hester*, as her name suggests), she finally comes to understand that to be Jewish is to stand up and stand out – for the beliefs, collective wisdom, and sacred history of our people. Can we say the same about ourselves, about our own behavior today? As Jews living in a country where we face both unprecedented levels of freedom, and frightening levels of antagonism, do we try to blend in with the crowd (like the Jews of Persia), or do we stand up for our beliefs and our people (like Mordechai and Esther)? The choice, as always, is ours. May we have the strength, courage, and wisdom to choose our own fate through our own actions, controlling what we can, when we can, instead of letting the lots (*Purim*) fall where they may. *Hag Purim Sameach.*


"The Word is Passed - A Reckoning with the History of Slavery Across America."





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
