A PURIM REMINDER TO DRINK IN MODERATION



When I was in college, one of the Jewish holidays that got the most traction at Hillel and the local modern Orthodox synagogue was Purim. Why? Because of popular-held belief that it is somehow a mitzvah to drink alcohol in excess on Purim. But is it really true that drinking on Purim is somehow a "mitzvah?" Where does this idea come from and what about our obligation to take care of our health and avoid self-destructive and dangerous behavior?

The concept of drinking on Purim originates from a statement in the Talmud that on Purim a person is supposed to drink until they do not know the difference between the megillah's claims, "Cursed be Haman" and "Blessed be Mordechai." Unfortunately, this Talmudic text is often taken as a blank check to drink in excess on Purim. There are many Seudot Purim

(Festive Purim Meals) in which participants use this text as an excuse to engage in irresponsible behavior as they drink with complete disregard for their own health, or the behavior that they are modeling for everyone else in the room. While this behavior was historically all too common in observant circles, in recent years there has fortunately been an attempt to educate observant Jews that drinking in excess is actually a sin, and not a mitzvah. Indeed one does not have to look very far in the classical sources to discover that, while drinking in moderation is permitted in general, and even encouraged on Purim, getting completely drunk is forbidden.

In the classic legal code of the Shulchan Arukh, Rabbi Moses Isserles writes:

"On Purim a Person should drink until he does not know the difference between 'Cursed be Haman' and 'Blessed be Mordechai.' There are some authorities say that it is not necessary to get completely drunk, but merely to drink more than one's normal allowance, so that he may fall asleep and, because he is asleep, not know the difference between 'Cursed be Haman' and 'Blessed be Mordechai.' It is immaterial whether one drinks a lot or a little as long as his thoughts are directed to God." Shulchan Arukh, 695: 2 (15th Century)

In other words, drinking in moderation is fine, but drinking in excess in a way that causes us to forget that we are holy is forbidden. Indeed the Hebrew word for drinking in this text, ("lebasumei") indicates a less intense type of drinking than the more common Hebrew word, le-shaker, meaning "to get drunk."

Very early on in the sources, we have a warning about the dangers of drinking in excess on Purim. In a slightly humorous story found in tractate Megillah we read that:

Rabbah and Rabbi Zera joined together in a Purim feast. They became somewhat drunk, and Rabbah arose and cut Rabbi Zera's throat [and killed him]. The next day Rabbah prayed on his behalf and revived him. Next year Rabbah said to Rabbi Zera: Will you come next year and we will have the Purim feast together? Rabbi Zera: A miracle does not take place on every occasion! **Babylonian Talmud, Megillah 7b**


Again, the message here seems to be – celebrate with caution. Dangerous things can happen when we drink too much and not everyone will be as lucky as Rabbi Zera! The medieval commentator, the Meiri, in his notes to this passage explains that indeed, we are not commanded to get drunk and denigrate ourselves during this time of joy, for we have not been commanded [to experience] joy in the form of disgrace and stupidity. And another medieval legal commentary states clearly that

One should not get drunk – for inebriation is completely forbidden. There is no greater sin than this for it causes forbidden sexual relationships, murder, and many other sins. However, one should drink a little more than usual in order to increase happiness and also to create happiness and comfort for the poor. This is full happiness. (Schwartz, David, Purim and the Journey To Oblivion: Is Inebriation Really a Mitzvah; Sefaria)

In the end, drinking on Purim, or on any other day, is only acceptable in moderation. If someone struggles with alcohol addiction, they are obligated **not to drink on Purim.** Indeed, we are never allowed to engage in behavior that will endanger our health. As Rabbi Brad Artson explains, there is a principle in Jewish law that health concerns override ritual requirements (*sakanta chamura m'issura*). This is one such example.

With all of this in mind, this Purim, let us take this message to heart (both in general, and for the holiday) as a reminder that celebrating with alcohol consumption can be fine in moderation. But anything more than that violates the spirit and letter of the law. May we rejoice, revel, and remember our past *responsibly* – and may we encourage others to do the same. Hag Purim Sameach to you and your families!




