BLOTTING OUT HAMAN'S NAME



As we head into March, Purim is right around the corner. Complete with a dress-up party, the reading of the Megillah, games, revelry, and our enjoyment of way too many Hamantashen, Purim is considered a light and fun holiday by many. But in truth, Purim has a serious and dark side to it as well. From lessons of what it means to be Jewish in an assimilated society, to the ways in which we mask our identities, to issues of religious extremism and zealotry (including our own killing rampage of the Persians in Shushan [a part of the story that we are happy to skip over each year]), the story of Purim has much to teach us about both the opportunities and the

dangers of living in an integrated and multi-cultural society. It has much to teach us about the dangers of senseless hatred, that which is directed towards us, and that which we must strive not to direct towards others. Just listen to the following description of the evil Haman from my colleague Rabbi Mark Greenspan.

Scene one: The story begins at a royal party. When Vashti refuses to appear before the king au natural, it is Haman (or someone with a name similar to him [Mahuman]) who suggests that the king banish the queen and pick a new one. What is his reason for this? If the king lets Vashti get away with disrespecting the king, then all the women in Shushan will disrespect their husbands! So the story of Purim begins with misogyny. And the disrespect for women begins with Haman/Mahuman. We learn from this that hatred is hardly ever limited to a single group of people -- people who hate others, for a variety of reasons including gender, race and religion. One leads to another. But no one seems to notice this in Shushan.

Scene two: Haman becomes the Prime Minister. And the first thing that he demands is that everyone must bow down to him. Haman has a huge ego and he demands that people show him absolute allegiance. Rather than recognizing that he is a dangerous demagogue, the people of Persia do as he demands. When he speaks they all cheer. When Mordechai refuses to bow down to Haman, they inform the Prime Minister. The second lesson of Purim: who are the real villains in this story Haman or the people who are willing to support a demagogue? Again, no one seems to notice this in Shushan.

Scene three: Haman becomes furious with Mordechai when he refuses to acquiesce to him. But rather than aim his wrath at one person he dislikes, he decides to get rid of every Jew in Shushan. Haman is a classic bigot. He says, "I hate you so I must hate all your people. You are all the same."

The real lesson of Purim then is not that Haman hates the Jews, but that Haman is simply a hateful person. He hates women; he has no respect for his countrymen and he hates anyone who he perceives as different, **A Purim Postscript: Living in a World of Hate — by Mark Greenspan**

The Shabbat just prior to Purim is called *Shabbat Zachor*, the Shabbat of Remembrance. It is called that because our *Maftir Torah* reading on Shabbat is about the biblical tribe of Amalek, an evil and hateful group who sought to attack the Israelites from the rear. The Amalekites were understood to be a group who targeted those that they felt were somehow weak and inferior -- the Israelites at the time -- a people who they saw as deserving to be at the "back of the line." As Haman was understood to be a descendent of Amalek, our Purim story begins by reminding us never to forget those in our history who acted with hate and vengeance towards our way of life. We are reminded of this because of **both** the particulars of anti-Semitism, and the dangers that anti-Semitism represents for a society as a whole. Because while it seems that senseless bigotry and hatred always come back to the Jews, it is not always only about us (even if it can sometimes feel that way).

All of this brings us to today. As this Purim approaches we continue to be in a challenging time as Jews and Americans. Hatred against Jews in particular, in America and abroad, seems to be everywhere and intolerance more generally speaking seems on the rise in our country as well. The challenge is this: How can we remember our obligation to stand up for our people and stand up against anti-Semitism of any kind, while simultaneously speaking out against hatred, bigotry, and intolerance of all kinds. This, I admit, has become more challenging for many, post-October 7th, when it often feels like we, as Jews, do not have many


people sticking up for us, or speaking out on our behalf. I must admit that there are days when the silence (on any particular anti-Semitic moment) is deafening. And yet, the Purim story is a reminder to all of us that it is only once we are willing to unmask our own biases and confront all voices of intolerance and hatred in our society, that we, like Esther, have a chance at turning the tide of history -- both for the Jews, and indeed for all of humanity, even when this feels hard to do.

When we hear voices filled with hate, intolerance, objectification, and ignorance, how do we respond? Do we simply shrug in despair, roll our eyes, or rant about it on social media? What *productive and meaningful* things are we doing to follow in the footsteps of a Mordechai who refused to tolerate such hatred, or an Esther who was brave enough to stand out against hatred even when it was uncomfortable? These are the questions that we are asked to continue confronting as Purim rolls around.

This year, as you we are noshing on some Hamantashen, or enjoying our Megillah reading and Purim festivities, let us take a few moments to consider the small and large ways that we can stand up for a more loving, tolerant, and accepting society. And if we feel moments of despair, let us remind ourselves that above all, hope is always possible and that we, like Esther, can bravely stand up against the tide of hatred and become someone who makes a difference in the world. May we soon see the day when hate against Jews and intolerance of all kind, is drowned out, not only by groggers, but by shouts of love, laughter, and mutual respect.

Hag Purim Sameach! Have a wonderful and joyous Purim!





Mining For Meaning In "The Maggid"

One of the most significant sections in the Passover Haggadah is "the *Maggid*," or "telling" section. Ironically, this section does not contain the narrative of the Exodus from Egypt. Indeed the "telling" of the story of the Israelites journey from slavery to freedom is nowhere to be found in a traditional Passover Haggadah. Instead, *Maggid* contains some of the most memorable parts of the seder from the four questions, to the four children, to the ten plagues, the singing of *dayenu*, and the food symbols of *Rabban Gamliel* (*Pesach, Matzah, and Maror*). How is all of this related to "the telling" of the Exodus from Egypt and how might we learn to move from "mumbling" the *Maggid* to "finding meaning" in it? 



Meet Jane Loeb Rubin, author of Threadbare



Threadbare, written by Jane Loeb Rubin, recounts the story of an innocent but tenacious young girl who chooses marriage to Abe, a lonely widower, rather than follow her farming community north as urban development transforms rural Harlem. Convinced Abe will help her attend high school on the Lower East Side, she faces a rude awakening to the filth and disease of the tenements. Through the following decades, Tillie turns her energy and intelligence to partnering with Abe as he builds a thriving button business while she and her neighbor Sadie launch a unique garment company. Pushing back against anti-Semitic Victorian values dominating the time, she acquires wealth only to have her life upended by a devastating, unforeseen challenge.

Threadbare is the prequel to the first book of the trilogy, **In the Hands of Women.** Jane's other publications include an essay memoir, **Almost a Princess, My Life as a Two-Time Cancer Survivor** and multiple magazine articles.

Ms. Rubin, a graduate of the University of Michigan (BS, MS) and Washington University (MBA), retired from a 30-year career as a healthcare executive to begin writing full-time. She lives with her husband, David, an attorney, in Northern New Jersey. Between them, they have five adult children and seven grandchildren.
