RE-THINKING THE "RASHA" - IS HE REALLY SO BAD?

When I was growing up, there were certain rituals that happened around the seder table each year. When we got to the Ma Nishtanah, the youngest (usually me) had to ask the four questions. When we got to the end of the seder, we would have a competition around who could sing the Hebrew songs the fastest and with the most accuracy. (I am sure it would surprise none of you to learn that I loved that part!) When we got to the cup of Elijah, someone would try to kick the table to make it seem "as if" Elijah drank from the wine. And when we got to the four sons (I always loved this part), my father was usually chosen by his younger sister to be the *rasha*, the wicked one, as he protested loudly that he should be the *chacham*, the wise one (sibling rivalry at its finest)!

In truth, there has always been a part of me that felt that the "wicked son" got a bad rap – and not just because my father was chosen to play the part! The Haggadah speaks of four children. One who is wise, one who is wicked, one who is simple, and one who doesn't even know how to ask a question. This passage of the Haggadah, largely taken from rabbinic texts, comes from the *Mechilta*, an early midrash from the first and second centuries C.E. There are a variety of versions of the descriptions of the four sons that are slightly different from one another. And, as with so many other things, there are numerous interpretations about just what exactly these four sons represent. Are they supposed to be about different types of Jews? Do they represent each one of us at different moments in our lives? Do we have a bit of each child within us at all times? As with many passages in the Haggadah, there are often more questions than answers. But the question that I have gravitated to this year is the specific one that is asked by the *rasha*, the wicked son. When we look at it closely, I am not sure why it is a bad question, nor am I sure that it has to be read in the way that it is traditionally understood. The text reads:

"The wicked child asks 'Whatever does this service mean to you? (Exodus 12:26)' The child emphasizes "to you" and not to himself or herself! Since the child excludes himself or herself from the community and rejects a major principle of faith, you should "set that child's teeth on edge" and say: 'It is because of this that Adonai did for me when I went free from Egypt. (Exodus 13:8)' 'For me, and not for that one. Had that one been there, he or she would not have been redeemed.' (Zion, Dishon, A Different Night)"

The classic reading of this text is that the wicked child is punished (harshly, it seems – no hitting at the seder please!) because he separates himself from the community. He says what does all of this avodah, (work/service) mean to **you**? By saying "you," he removes himself from the group, from his people. But here's the problem. That question, taken from Exodus 12, seems to have no negative connotations in its original context. In chapter 12 of Exodus, the Torah simply says:

"And when your children ask you: 'What do you mean by this rite?' You shall say, 'It is the Passover sacrifice to Adonai who passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt, when smiting the Egyptians, but saved our houses.' Those assembled then bowed low in homage. Exodus: 12: 26-27"

The context here is Moses explaining to the children of Israel how to observe the Festival to commemorate the Exodus from Egypt. There are a number of instructions, including the obligation to put blood on the doorposts, quickly eat roasted lamb with matzah and bitter herbs, eat unleavened bread, and remove all leaven from your household starting on the 14th of Nisan. The Torah tells us that this Festival is to be "an institution for all time" (which is why we are still observing it!), and that its celebration involves explaining to their children that this is done "because of what Adonai did for me when I went free from Egypt." There does not seem to be any judgement in the verses that eventually become the texts around which the question from, and answer to, the wicked son is designed. Instead, the key emphasis seems to be in the sacred practice of asking just what this Passover ritual is all about; just what all of these practices mean.

The rabbinic impulse is often to point out the importance of being a part of a community, a part of a people. This was important then, and remains critical today. As we gather together for the second time living in our post-October 7th reality, there is a real opportunity at our seder tables to discuss just what exactly it means to belong to this people and to see this story as our own. But I think the question out of the mouth of the "wicked son" is a good one. What does all of this mean to you? It is, in actuality, the original question that was anticipated by the Torah.

What does it mean to be Jewish? Is your Jewish identity connected to the rituals that you practice? To the values that you live? To the culture with which you identify? To which aspect of Judaism do you give the most weight and why? What does it mean to belong to a people with a connection to the land of Israel that goes back thousands of years? What does it mean to belong to this particular people? What does it mean to be "set apart," even as the particular story of our people has universal concerns (i.e.. caring for the oppressed because we were oppressed, recognizing everyone as made in God's image)? When you go back and read Exodus 12 and 13, it seems that the main thing is to explore the meaning of this Passover story in particular, and of your Jewish identity more generally. So this year, "be wicked" and take a moment to ask each other: "Just what does all of this mean to me?" "How is Judaism relevant in my daily life?" Listen to each other's answers, honor each other's experiences, and above all, remember this incredible privilege it is to be a part of this people.

Hag Kasher v'Sameach – may you all have a meaningful Passover holiday, may our people know peace and bring peace into the world, and may our hostages all come home.

Sale of Chametz

During the week of Pesach, it is forbidden for any Jew to own chametz. To avoid the unnecessary financial hardship that could result from requiring Jews to dispose of all items that are chametz, it is tradition to sell items of chametz to non-Jews for the week of Pesach. If you would like to sell your chametz to ensure that you abide by the Jewish law of not owning any chametz during the week of Pesach, please fill out the form below and return it to the Temple no later than **Thursday, April 10, 5:00pm**.

The Punk Rock Queen of the Jews – a Memoir by Rossi



Meet Talia Carner, author of *The Boy with the Star Tattoo*



The Boy with the Star Tattoo is an epic historical novel of ingenuity and courage, of love and loss, weaving two yet untold events set in France. The first is set in 1946 in the aftermath of the Holocaust, when agents from Eretz Israel roamed the European countryside to rescue hidden Jewish orphans (Youth Aliyah). The second covers the 1969 daring escape of the boats of Cherbourg, in Normandy-five boats that had been commissioned and paid for by Israel, but whose delivery was blocked by a French arms embargo.

Sharon, the assistant to an Israeli naval officer stationed in Cherbourg, is set to unravel the mystery of his journey from a French village to Israel. As she traces it to the tragedy of a mother who lost her baby in the mayhem of war, she is unprepared for the moral dilemma she must face upon solving the puzzle.

Israeli-born Talia Carner is an award-winning author of six historical and psychological suspense novels that shed light on social indignities and unexplored historical events. Formerly the publisher of *Savvy Woman* magazine and a lecturer at international women's economic forums, this trailblazer of projects centered on women's issues has turned her energies to fighting for Israel. She lives in New York and Florida.



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
